Many people were undoubtedly hoping that it would have been found possible to adapt the relay system to factories and workshops, and that workpeople would be able to take their holidays in the same way that office workers and the professional classes generally do. From the workers' point of view such an arrangement would unquestionably offer several advantages, one of the most important being that it would obviate the temporary overcrowding of the holiday resorts and enable factory and foundry workers to obtain a change of air and scene in greater comfort and at a comewhat reduced cost. Evidently their nvestigations have convinced the committee releasing of workers in batches in this way cannot be accomplished without serious oss and interference with output, and their conclusion, we presume, must be regretfully eccepted." People have grown quite accustomed to have collecting boxes thrust under their noses on all sorts of occasions, and, so far from resenting these solicitations, the majority of them have got into the habit of dropping their pennies, and, in many cases, their threepenury bits and sispences, into the boxes without inquiring into the credentials of the collectors or giving a thought to the cause for which their rid is sought. This is all very creditable in its way, and no one can wish for a moment to check the flow of generosity or to put any obstacles in the way of legitimate collection on behalf of worthy been growing up among the more thoughtful sec-tion of the populace that this collecting business pre-sents possibilities of abuse, and that there are ce-tain dangers associated with it which call for serious

RELAY HOLIDAYS.

ADVICE OF THE MINISTRY OF MUNITIONS.

The Ministry of Munitions announce that the Committee appointed under the chairmanship of Mr. Arthur Hendstreon, Mr., to report on the arrangements to be made for the release of workmen for holidays in relays without interruption of the output of munitions, has reported unanimously that no general system of relay holidays is practicable. In view of the urgent need to maintain the supply of munitions, it is still impossible to contemplate the national or local holidays which the representatives of workmen's associations agreed to positrous in response to Sir Dougha Haig a message. The Minister, however, recognised that it is necessary to arrange for some period of rest in order both to carry out repairs to plant and machinery and to a word the physical and mental exhaustion resulting from latigue, and the consequent failing-off in production.

The Minister therefore proposes to adore the

The Minister therefore proposes to adopt the unanimous recommendation of the Committee that any munition works which have not been stopped for rest or holidays since Easter should be closed for the case of filing factories and of certain other closes of work, of which early notification will be made, where military exigencies do not permit of closing; and where a system of rest periods by relay will be arranged. The period selected by the Minister for the rest period (subject to unforcesom minitary exigencies) is Thursday, September 23, to Sunday, October 1, inclusive.

It is to be understood that what is proposed, is strictly a rest period for munition workers, and not a national holiday in lieu of the postponed bank holidays.


