DISCOVERY OF GAS DURING WELL-BORING OPERATIONS.

A remarkable discovery of what is assumed to be marsh gas has been made during well-boring operations at the mills of Mesara, Joseph Hoyle and Sona, Longwood, Huddersfield. Despite the dry weather the allotments in Keighley are looking extremely healthy and giving gromise of good crops. Splendid enthusiasm is being shown, and old and young men are fading the pursuit infinitely more faccinating than they evers imagined it, and doubtless many are now wondering whether they will be able to retain their plots after the war. If security of tenure is to be ensured it will be necessary for allotment holders to combine, and in order that they may be in a position to carry weight when this important question definitely asserts itself an effort is being made to form a strong allotment-holders to desting the strong frederation for the Keighley Parliamentary area. A meeting is to be held at the Keighley Temperance Institute on June 25, and societies are asked to send one or two representatives to it. It is calculated that in the area there are well over 5,000 allotments, so these should be no difficulty in forming a strong federation. It is felt that in some cases a very strong backing of allotment holders will be necessary if plots are to be retained after the war.

The Food Production Department is taking drastic measures to try to check the spread of this disease, and it is pointed out that the public and the trade can help materially in this work. The need of such help is apparent in view of the state ment that unless vigorous precautions are taken it seems likely that in a very few years there will be enormous areas in England and Wales in which only immune and resistant varieties can be grown. Growers should study carefully the symptoms of the disease, as set out in the free lesslets obtainable from the Board of Agriculture; and if they find a suspicious care on their land they should immediately communicate with the local police or the Board. If they fail to do this, and wart disease is present, they may be fined £10. Traders also should note that their duties are considerably extended by the new order. Recently several trades, have been heavily fined for contraspentions of the war disease regulations, and it is liftimated that in future no pice of ignorance will be accepted by the authorities.

They represent a decided improvement on the old scale, and will go some way to help in meeting the pseuniary pressure to which sallors and soldiers' dependents, like the rest of us, are subjected by reason of the increasing cost of nearly everything in general demand.



Mr. Robinson said that in fixing prices the Food Ministry had performed a national service to the public nealth to a greater extent than had perhaps been appreciated.
