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THE THRUST ON THE SOMME. HEAVY COUNTER ATTACKS.

THE THRUST ON THE SOMME. HEAVY COUNTER ATTACKS. LAST GROUND REGAINED BY THE BRITISH.

Sir Douglas Haig, in his first despatch on Saturday, stated that all continued to go well on the British front. The enemy had been forced back to his third system of defence, more than four miles in the rear of his original front trenches at Friocourt and Mametz.

Following up this success, our soldiers stormed and captured the German second-line positions on a front of 1,500 yards north-west of Bazentin-le-Petit Wood, the enemy's losses being very severe.

As was only to be expected, heavy counter-attacks were soon launched against our troops. These directed on Tuesday evening against the new British positions near Longueval were of a particularly vicious character.

More ground won back. A despatch received from the British General Headquarters on Thursday says that in Delville Wood our Longueval we have regained a little more ground. The struggle in these areas still continues.

Russians take 3,000 prisoners. There has been a recrudescence of Russian activity in Volhynia, with heavy captures, 3,000 prisoners having already been counted.

THE BRITISH ADVANCE. ANOTHER MOVE FORWARD. FRENCH CAPTURE 2,900 PRISONERS.

Sir Douglas Haig's despatch yesterday afternoon says that the battle continues without intermission between the Leipzig Redoubt on the west and Delville Wood on the east.

Elsewhere there is no change in the situation. On Wednesday (Friday) the morning carried out successful enterprises by day and night.

The positions won north of the Somme in the morning have been consolidated. South of the front the French troops have been engaged in a counter-attack and carried in its entirety the first line German position from Estrées to the hill of Verdun.

Officers continue to add their tributes to the gallantry with which certain battalions of the West Yorkshire Regiment went into action on July 1. In addition to the letters from Lieutenant-Colonel C. W. Warden, Major Herbert F. G. Carter, and other officers which have already been published in 'The Yorkshire Observer', the Lord Mayor of Bradford (Mr. Thomas Howarth) has received the communications appended:—

Dear Sir,—Having the honour to command the brigade which the battalions of the — and — West Yorkshire Regiment—which you took so leading a part in raising—form units I feel sure you would like to hear of the most gallant behaviour of the battalions in their first serious engagement.

Just a line to say how sorry we are to hear of the losses which your magnificent corps has recently suffered in its brilliant fighting on the German trenches. They are indeed heroes, and their names will live for ever.

POULTRY KEEPING. A BEAUTIFUL WYANDOTTE. 'BY UTILITY.'

Partridge Wyandottes are perhaps the most handsome of the great Wyandotte family, which is saying a great deal. As utility birds they have never attracted great attention, though many breeders claim that they are, when bred from unrelated stock, good layers of a mixed egg.

The breeding of exhibition partridge Wyandottes, since they were introduced into this country in 1869, has not proved at all an easy matter, and even from the best stock, and by the method of using two separate pens—one for cockerel breeding and one for pullet breeding—it is still very difficult to get pullets approaching standard.

Yellow-legged birds for the table sell very much better than those used to do, and no doubt many fastidious people have discovered with some surprise that this feature need not affect the quality of the flesh.

When an egg is fresh and in good condition the white is bright and the yolk is in the centre. If when an egg is turned by the hand the yolk swims out towards the shell the egg is either not fresh or it is weak, and should not be classed as a 'new laid.'

At this time of the year trouble is always experienced with shell-less eggs, and much waste is undoubtedly occasioned thereby.
