GALA COMMITTEE'S CONTRIBUTION TO VICTORIA HOSPITAL. The final meeting of the Keighley Friendly Societies' Gala Committee for season 1918 was held at the Albion Hall on Tuesday night, Mr. J. Hagill presiding. Mr. J. Hagill presided, the committee reported a credit balance of £154 12s. on gala account and £57 7s. on Sunday concert account. By Alexandra Ross Day £25 12s. was raised, including balance from previous years and bank interest, amounting to £298; of this sum £120 had been handed over to the hospital, leaving a balance of £178. The receipts from the concert, including the proceeds of the sale of programmes, amounted to £130 10s. The committee's property to be valued at £200. Mr. J. Hagill, Secretary, moved that a further sum of £70 be handed over to the hon. treasurer of the Victoria Hospital, bringing the committee's contribution for the year to £248. The proposal was unanimously adopted. Referring to the large sum raised by street collections, Mr. Harrison acknowledged the good work done by the wounded soldiers, who, out of the total of £27, had collected £38, which he considered a very good result. It was noted that £24 had been raised by the sale of programmes, the ladies on the gala day. Alexandra Ross Day did not prove as successful as was hoped, there being a shortage of collectors, and it was suggested that each member of the committee should take at least one of the programmes to sell. The report and balance-sheet were adopted.

CHILD'S DEATH AFTER A FALL.—An inquiry was conducted by Mr. Edgar Wood at the Keighley Police Station yesterday afternoon into the circumstances relative to the death of William Jackson, the three-year-old child of Joseph Jackson, painter, of 23, Quarry Street, Keighley, which occurred at the Victoria Hospital on Wednesday. Dr. Scott said that the child had sustained a multiple fracture of the lower jaw, which might have been caused by his chin striking a sharp projection in a fall from some height.—Joseph Jackson, the father, said that on Friday afternoon the child came to his sister to the gate of the foundry where he was employed. Witness told him to stay where he was while he went to lock up, and when he was returning the boy came running towards him. His mouth was bleeding, and he fell. Witness took him home, and in attending to him discovered that the child's jaw was broken, so he took him to Dr. Berry. The latter examined him and instructed witness to take the child to the hospital. There was a deep bruise on the roadside close to the foundry gates, and there were two piles of pig-iron near by. Witness had seen him climb on the pig-iron, and he had seen him get down. Dr. Scott said the little boy attempted to climb over the wall of the foundry, and after getting several feet up he slipped and fell on some iron which was sharply pointed. The boy had told him that he was trying to get over the wall to find a pig-iron member of the firm said that the pig-iron was laid in a private street, but they had given instructions for its removal.—Mr. Wood found that death was caused by the fracture of the jaw, which was a fatal injury. The committee expressed sympathy with the bereaved relatives, and added that the father had been in their employ for over twenty-five years. This was the first inquest held in Keighley without a jury.

On Thursday afternoon Mr. Rothera provided an excellent tea for the staff and soldiers at the hospital, while in the evening a whole drive and fancy dress ball was held at the Victoria Hospital, and the wounded men took the opportunity to present Mr. and Mrs. Rothera with a silver cake stand as a token of their esteem.

The official announcement of the circumstances of the award for the Second Lieutenant Norman Feather, West Yorkshire Regiment, was awarded the Military Cross for gallantry on the 27th October 1917. As the attack developed, finding that the enemy was in a very strong position, he formed a reconnaissance under heavy rifle fire and formed a defensive flank, enabling him to successfully hold up the enemy.
